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Complex Vowel Sounds

Complex Vowels: vowels which consist of more than one vowel gliding towards each other being combined together as one.

Complex Vowels are divided into two types:

- 1. Diphthongs
- 2. Triphthongs
- **Diphthongs** differ from **Triphthongs** in the number of vowel sounds combined together to make them and in the number of glides.
- In **Diphthongs** there are *two vowel sounds* and *one glide*.
- In **Triphthongs**, there are *three vowel sounds* and *two glides*.

1. Diphthongs: are a type of vowel sounds consisting of two vowels produced as one.

<u>Or</u>: vowels which consist of a movement (glide) from one vowel to another.

2. Triphthongs: are a type of vowel sounds consisting of three vowels produced as one.

<u>Or</u>: vowels which consist of a movement (glide) from one vowel to another then to a third.

Types of Diphthongs:

1- Centring Diphthongs:

- Diphthongs gliding towards the central area.
- They start from vowels /I/, /v/ or /e/ and end in the central area in vowel /ə/.

2- Closing Diphthongs:

- Diphthongs gliding towards the close-front or close-back areas.
- They either start from vowels /e/, /æ/ or /ɔ:/ and end in the close-front area in vowel /I/.
- Or start from vowels /a:/ and /ə/ and end in the close-back area in vowel /ʊ/.

Triphthongs:

- Vowel sounds which consist of three vowels combined together and produced as one vowel sound.
- Each triphthong consists of the three symbols.
- They consist of one of the five closing diphthongs plus vowel /ə/:

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/ei/ + /ə/ = /eiə/
/ai/ + /ə/ = /aiə/
/ai/ + /ə/ = /aiə/
/au/ + /ə/ = /auə/
/əu/ + /ə/ = /əuə/
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
