# English Vowels 

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## What is meant by vowels?

- They are speech sounds that are made(produced) by voiced air passing through different mouth shapes; the differences in the shape of the mouth are caused by different positions of the tongue and of the lips.
- There are 20 vowel sounds in English(12 vowels, 8 diphthongs) . English vowels can be divided into two types: short vowels( simple vowels) , they are seven in number. Long vowels are six in number.

## Some Notes

- The vowel / ə/ is the commonest of the English .It is a short and indistinct when it is not final. In final position, that is before a pause , the vowel/ ə/ more like /^/.
- There are two main difficulties with this vowel: First, to identify it and second, to get the right quality. In the first case, do not be deceived by English spelling ; there is no single letter which always stands for / ə/,so rely on your ear. Second, it is often useful to think of leaving out the vowel altogether where / ə/ comes between consonants.
/ ə/ occurs in initial, medial, and in final position.
