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

# Adverbs of Frequency

➤ How often does an action takes place in your life.

- |   |      |
|---|------|
| ➤ They <b>always</b> study after class.       | 100% |
| ➤ He <b>usually</b> walk to work.             | 90%  |
| ➤ She <b>normally</b> goes to sleep at 9 p.m. | 80%  |
| ➤ I <b>often</b> spend weekends at home.      | 70%  |
| ➤ <b>Sometimes</b> I watch movies.            | 50%  |
| ➤ We only meet <b>occasionally</b> .          | 30%  |
| ➤ He <b>seldom</b> goes to the library.       | 10%  |
| ➤ I <b>rarely</b> listen to the radio.        | 5%   |
| ➤ He <b>never</b> goes to gym.                | 0%   |

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- These adverbs usually come before the main verb.
  - *Sometimes* and *usually* can also come at the beginning or the end of a sentence.
  - *Never* and *always* never come at the beginning or the end of a sentence.



# like / love + verb + -ing

When *like* and *love* are followed by another verb, it is usually the -ing form:

She **likes** cooking.

He **loves** listening to music.

I don't **like** studying.
